Bishop Michael Curry

Born 1953 in Chicago, Bishop Curry is descended from slaves.

He attended public schools in Upstate New York.

Father was an Episcopal priest and his mother a devout Episcopalian.

Grandparents from NC and Alabama but migrated north seeking relief from Jim Crow oppression.

Education

Received undergrad from Hobart College in Geneva, NY and MDiv from Yale Divinity School.

Continuing education at several places including Princeton Theological (Presbyterian), and honorary degrees from several other places including Virginia Theological Seminary (Alexandria).

Ministry

Ordained into priesthood 1978 in Winston-Salem, NC. Served parishes in NC, Ohio and Maryland.

Elected to a nine-year term as presiding bishop in 2015.

Throughout his ministry, Presiding Bishop Curry has been active in issues of social justice, reconciliation, speaking out on immigration policy and marriage equality.

Author

In addition to *Love is the Way*, Bishop Curry has written four other books, including *The Power of Love* and *Following the Way of Jesus: Church's Teachings in a Changing World*.

Breakout 1

Bishop Curry explains what he is doing with his book, and he offers this Frederick Buechner quote from *Now and Then:* "Listen to your life. See it for the fathomless mystery it is.
