What Is Domestic Violence?

Domestic violence is when one person does a variety of things to control another person in an intimate relationship. Ways a person might try to gain power and control over their partner include isolation, economic abuse, verbal/emotional/psychological abuse, intimidation, coercion and threats, physical abuse, minimizing, denying, and blaming.

Research Shows...

- One in 5 women have experienced severe physical violence
- One in 7 men have experienced severe physical violence
- One in 5 women have experienced sexual violence
- One in 12 men have experienced sexual violence
- 43 million women have experienced psychological abuse
- o 38 million men have experienced psychological abuse

Understanding Domestic Violence

Healthy

A healthy relationship means both you and your partner are:

- Communicating
- Respectful
- Trusting
- Honest
- Equal
- Enjoying personal time away from each other
- Making mutual choices
- Economic/financial partners

Unhealthy

You may be in an unhealthy relationship if your partner is:

- Not communicating
- Disrespectful
- Not trusting
- Dishonest
- Trying to take control
- Only spends time together
- Pressured into activities
- Unequal economically

Abusive

Abuse is occuring in a relationship when one partner is:

- Communicating in a hurtful or threatening way
- Mistreating
- Accusing the other of cheating when it's untrue
- Denying their actions are abusive
- Controlling
- Isolating their partner from others

What Does Our Church Believe?

About submission

(Ephesians 5:22-23) Wives, submit yourselves to your own husbands as you do to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Savior.

(Ephesians 5:25-33) Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church... In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies... He who loves his wife loves himself... just as Christ does the church.

 (Luke 15:11-32) The parable of the prodigal son
