

Core beliefs used to identify Christian nationalist ideology

The United States was, is, should be a Christian nation

The US government should advocate Christian values

The US government should not enforce separation of church and state [in relation to Christianity]

The US government should allow the display of [Christian] religious symbols in public spaces

The success of the United States is part of God's plan

The US government should allow [formal, public] prayer in public schools

Defining characteristics of Christian nationalist ideology

Christian nationalism values three things:

- (1) "Power and making sure 'our' group stays in power"
- (2) "Maintaining proper boundaries between 'us' and 'them'"
- (3) "Establish and reinforce a very particular traditionalist social order in which everybody recognizes their proper place in the family, in society, in the church."

"An outbreak of discipleship"

- Seek the common good, reject a view of greatness that makes others small
- Live free from grudges, ready to offer forgiveness, preserve the possibility of future reconciliation
- Instead of turning to violence in word or deed, assert the power of unarmed truth... [with] due regard for our shared dignity
- Approach hard issues with humility, ...[knowing] that people who esteem the same ideal can come to different policy conclusions
- Honor the image of God in one another.... seek to subvert societal stratification in constructive ways to prioritize justice and common provision for people in need
- Assert there is hope... Live confidently with faith in God's mercy and hope
